FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As the year quickly draws to a close, Adam and I have been reflecting on just how much has been accomplished within the society since the day we took the keys. It is truly remarkable the support that has stepped up in the last 12 months and we cannot express our appreciation enough. I am very proud of our society's small crew and dedicated board members who have put in many hours into the entity everyone assumed was destined to be history itself. Our community has seen our efforts and it never gets old hearing the positive comments from citizens I meet throughout the county. The list of tasks accomplished and goals set will come out in the annual report at the end of January, but for now let me just say, WOW!

As a brief update to our situation I offer some important points:

- Capital campaigns for both the Hays and Victoria ECHS museum sites have been wonderfully successful in 2023.
- Volunteer help is gaining every month.
- Special projects and programs have been funded through small grants like never before.
- Fundraising events were successful this year.
- Utilizing intern opportunities allowed us to serve more tourists during the peak season of summer.
- Operational funding is not yet on par with what it will take to run a full time facility. ALL 4 employees are still only part-time.

In lieu of sending out a separate end of the year annual appeal I want to encourage our members to reach out and recruit new members and sponsors. Share our mission and good work with those you know, ask them to be a vital part of our society and join this exciting time of success!

Our current members have come through time and time again when we needed special funds (like the dehumidifiers this past summer). If you are looking for an end of year charitable deduction please consider giving to the ECHS general fund. Along with public funding, membership and sponsorships are the main source of revenue for operational expenditures. For 2023 our bottom line is in the black. But as we begin to open our doors for more events etc. it will become harder to make that goal without the community's generous help.

I am committed to using ECHS funds wisely as we forge ahead. A couple of other side projects on the horizon involve moving the millstones from FHSU campus to ECHS grounds, transporting an original dolcett (one of under 10 known to exist—invented, designed and produced by the Bissing family of Hays) from Montana, and reviving Pioneer Day and other kid friendly activities while the museum is still under construction.

I am honored to serve as your Executive Director and I believe our partnership will secure our society for the generations yet to come! Thank you!




LET US INTRODUCE YOU TO PATTY!

Patty Nicholas is a native of Western Kansas where she lived in Monument and Stockton during her childhood. She graduated from Stockton High School and started attending Fort Hays State University. While at FHSU, she worked in Forsyth Library in the Periodicals Department. Patty graduated from FHSU with a bachelor's degree in history and stayed at Forsyth Library with a full-time job after graduating.

She worked in the periodicals department for about 19 years, and then was asked to work in the Special Collections and Archives area of the library. The Special Collections area is mainly focused on the history of the university, but it does have other collections which includes the Center for Ethnic Studies that focuses on the history of the Volga-Germans. Patty was in that position for about 20 years, and she retired in June 2021.

Patty says, "During my years of working in Special Collections, I learned about the history and heritage of this area, and I met many people who helped me to learn along the way. It was my great pleasure to help patrons who had questions or were doing research on topics relating to this area".

After retiring, Patty started volunteering at the Hays Public Library. And she was offered an opportunity to work for the Ellis County Historical Society. Patty started in April 2023 as the ECHS Archival Assistant. She is available for reference questions, but her main job is to input information into the museum software,

DREAMS OF A DULCIMER

Brian McCormack, who lives down under in Australia, but has roots in Ellis County, wrote to us by email with a unique request. He is dedicated to preserving and passing on his Volga German heritage and traditions to his family. His mother is a Wasinger, daughter of Carl & Catherine (nee Pfeifer). Brian is searching for a dulcimer in need of a good home. He is a long time musician (drums, bass, keyboard, vocals) and also a composer. As Brian is reaching retirement age, he wants to master the hammered dulcimer. This news article from the Hays Sentinel in 1877 is from a time before Ellis County citizens gained a much deserved love of the dulcimer!

Monshure, a Russian village three miles below town, has a band of misicians, and their music is said to be excellent. A violin, clarionet, base viol and dulcimer are the instrument used. We would raise a voice of objection to none of them unless it might be to the dulcimer, for that is an instrument of torture which a free born citizen taketh to only under protest.

— CUT THROAT DUROC WITH GERMAN VISITORS —

A group of tourists from the **HISTORICAL RESEARCH ASSOCIATION OF GERMANS FROM EASTERN EUROPE E.V** (Munich Germany) visited us in September. They were excited to see all the Volga German heritage and pride that nests in the plains of the USA. They are associated with the Bayerisches Kulturzentrum der Deutschen aus Russland (BKDR) or in English the Bavarian Cultural Center of the Germans from Russia. BKDR is the publisher of the "Insights Into Religion.." exhibit we had on display during the fall. We invited the group to return in 2026 when we will celebrate the 150th Anniversary of the Volga German settlers of Ellis County. They in turn invited us to visit them when they open a new BKDR cultural center building in Nuremberg in late 2024 or 2025. Perhaps we can get a group and travel funds together by then!!



The ECHS archives own over 300 ledgers from the Ellis County District Court dating back to 1868. She goes through each ledger to get the names of plaintiffs, defendants, judges, etc. so that there will be an index to make it easy for researchers to look for specific names. To aid her work, Patty's has created Excel spreadsheets or Microsoft Word documents to keep track of the names which are then added to Past Perfect. The spreadsheets and Word documents are also added to Past Perfect. They contain the listing of the names, and any corrections, additions or notes.

The ledgers books are arranged in the archives room by slot number, and Patty started with Slot 1 back in April. On December 6 she began work on Slot 17.

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There have been a small number of ledgers that have less than 50 names, but for the most part, many of the ledgers have between 500-700 names.

There are over 300 ledgers which makes this a long but vital project for our archive resources.

We are so excited that Patty is part of our ECHS family and her work will mean future researchers have easy and important access to these records which were created in the earliest days of Ellis County.
